"Golden Rule" of Infection Control: Wash Your Hands.

The "How to..." of Handwashing. It's one of those things we all *think* we know. Here is a refresher course on the number one weapon in the infection control arsenal:

- 1. Wet hands under running water.
- 2. Apply soap.
- 3. Lather for at least 15 seconds. Pay special attention to the areas between the fingers, under nails, and around rings.
- 4. Rinse with running water. <u>Use a paper towel to</u>
 <u>turn off the faucet</u>. (Those were dirty hands you used to turn on the faucet.)
- 5. Dry hands with a clean paper towel.

"Ten Commandments" of Infection Control

- 1. Vaccinate all children, adults and pets against infectious disease.
- 2. Wash hands often, especially in cold and flu season.
- 3. Prepare food carefully and cook it thoroughly.
- 4. Use antibiotics exactly as your doctor directs.
- 5. Report an infection that does not heal to your doctor.
- 6. Avoid areas with lots of insects. Use insect repellent.
- 7. Be cautious around unfamiliar animals.
- 8. Avoid unprotected sex or intravenous drug use.
- 9. Ask about disease threats when you travel out of country.
- 10. Allow yourself time to recover when you are sick.
